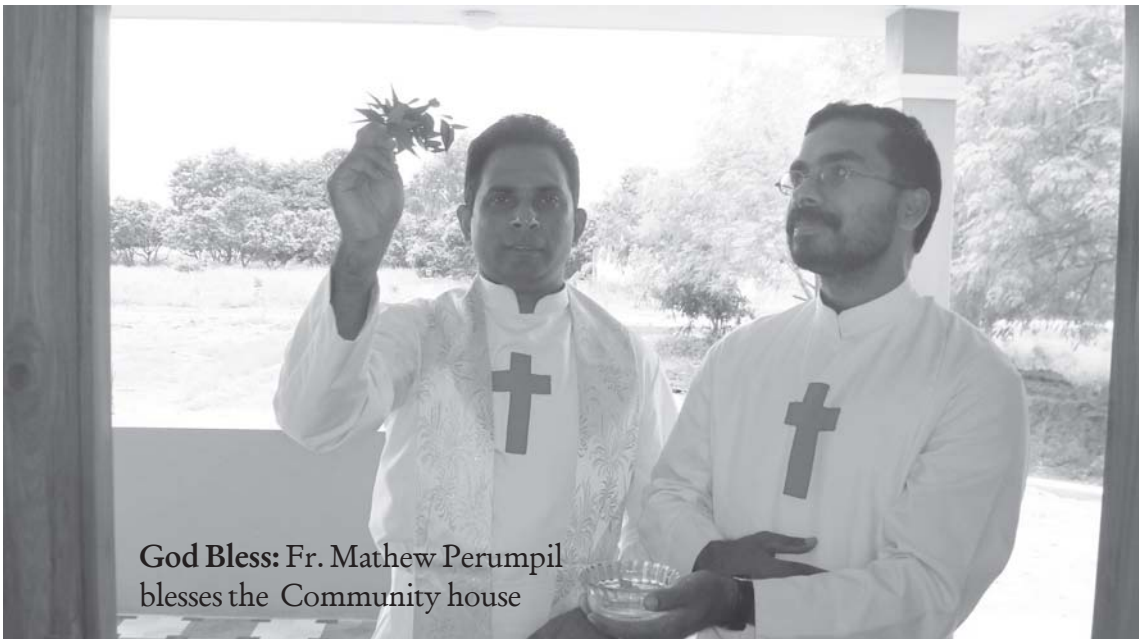
Snehakiran Inaugurated

Secunderabad: *Snehakiran* - Centre of Excellence, a collaborative venture of Camillians and Catholic Health Association of India (CHAI), was inaugurated here on September 19, 2008. Additional Project Director of Andhra Pradesh State Aids Control Society (APSACS) Dr. Kalidass inaugurated the community care centre for people living with HIV.

The director of CHAI Dr. Sebastian Ouseparambil presented the vision and mission of CHAI and *Snehakiran*. Fr. Mathew Perumpil addressed the meeting on behalf of Camillians and reiterated that Camillians were committed for the cause of the sick and suffering, especially of PLHIV.

The Centre is well-equipped with 65 beds, kitchen, dining hall, and staff quarters. Sisters of John the Baptist have joined hands with Camillians in this venture to provide nursing care to the patients. A building for the Community, well-furnished with six rooms and other facilities has been put up in the half-an-acre land leased from CHAI for 25 years.

Camillians have ventured into developing an intervention model for the Orphan and Vulnerable Children (OVC) in the context of HIV/AIDS. A maiden venture in the country, it is a combination of institutionalized and community based services, focusing on comprehensive care and protection to the OVC. This programme is to ensure quality of life for the OVC by comprehensively addressing their felt needs on health, education and psycho-social support.

The model is evolved to meet the long term needs like childhood development, adolescent issues, personality development, need - based education, value system to sustain them for life, employment, family and community acceptance etc. Present academic settings and curriculum are not favourable for OVC, as they are facing stigma and discrimination and amidst ongoing schedule, special needs of these children can not be addressed. Moreover,

poor value-based formation in early years of childhood and early exposure to multiple trauma can have a damaging effect on their over all development.

While *Sneha Care Home*, the residential facility provides a platform loaded with love, care and compassion, *Shining Star School*, the academic programme increases their confidence and self esteem. We use the National Open School System to develop a comprehensive educational package based on children's aptitude and intelligence. Apart from these children, the model also hopes to integrate care and rehabilitation of HIV-infected or affected destitute women who would re-discover a new meaning for their lives as they "create a new family in the Home".

The proposed model is to be developed in two phases: pre-adolescent and adolescent phase. In the pre-adolescent phase, the focus is on education, psycho-social support and



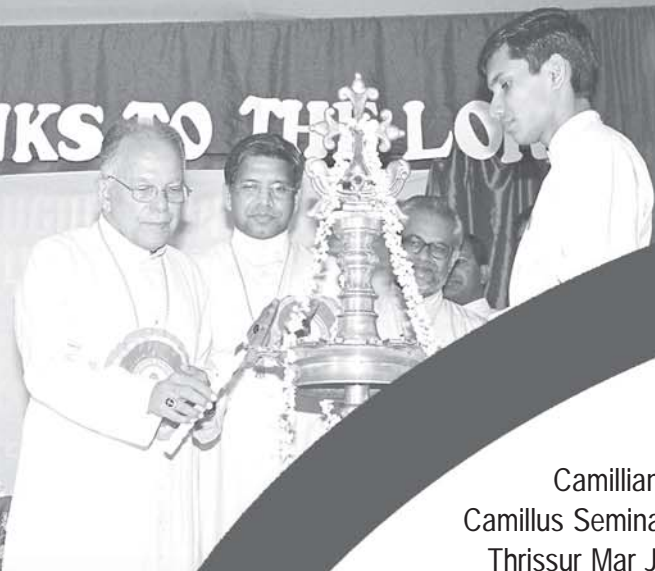

medico-spiritual care. Life skill education, moral values, and life enrichment programmes are integrated into the curriculum. Yoga, regular medical checkups, prevention of opportunistic infections, delaying initiation of ART, immunization are emphasized here. Nutritional education and guidance are emphasised and provision of balanced diet is ensured with the help of dieticians. Hygiene counseling and cleanliness are part of it.

In the adolescent phase at secondary and higher secondary level, vocational training will be provided and the students will be well-equipped to make their own living independently. Linkages will be made with the corporate sector for employing these children and there will be focused intervention for adolescents like sex education, ABC message, interventions for

responsible social and sexual life, identity crisis intervention, formation for emotional maturity and sensible disclosure of HIV infection. Community reintegration efforts which are made throughout the programme right from the pre-adolescent phase will be achieved during this phase. Constant ties with the community will be ensured and family interventions and out reach activities will be held accordingly. Income generation programmes and entrepreneurship building efforts will be carried out. Foster care or exploring possible parenthood for orphans will be another priority during both the phases.

Let this model be a great source of fillip and inspiration for many who are for this noble cause to address the issues of these little ones.

It's now around a month and couple of weeks that we three Camillians from India are here in Ireland. Fr. Vincent and I landed into the Irish earth, breathing fresh breezing air on 4th of September. Fr. Jayan arrived here two days later from Italy after his studies at Camillianum. It's getting pretty cold as the winter is approaching.

One weekend we were at our provincial house at Killucan. Fr. Frank Monks took care of us very well there. We have a few elderly confreres there, and we were in touch with the elder generations of our order and our history.

Fr. Vincent started working as a chaplain at Mater Misericordiae hospital in Ireland's Capital. He stays in the house given by the diocese, attached to the hospital, along with Fr. Stephen Fosters, the provincial

and the head chaplain. I do my C.P.E. program in the same hospital, but staying in a community a few miles away where Fr. Jayan lives. But Fr. Jayan does the C.P.E. in St. Vincent's hospital, close to the house. The program is quite serious and time-demanding with visiting patients, verbatim, reflections and reports. It's efforts-taking, but however interesting.

As it's predominantly a catholic country, service of chaplains is well recognized here. The work can be very straining at times, depending on calls one gets from the wards, besides Mass, meetings and regular visits.

We appreciate the Indian delegation, our mother province and the Anglo-Irish province here for all the help and support.

A Desire For India

The 16th and 17th centuries were well-known for missionary work, especially to the Asian continent (India, China, Japan etc) under *propaganda fide*, especially through Jesuits led by Francis Xavier.

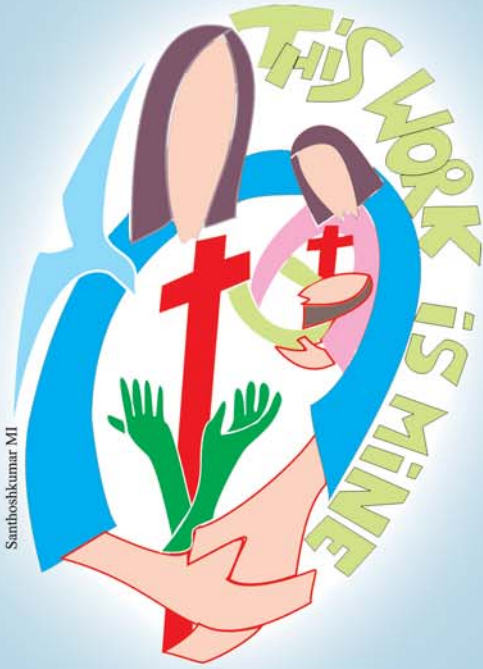
St. Camillus being close to the Jesuits, having St. Philip Neri, Jesuit Priest as his spiritual director, was update with the news from the missions. Mission and conversion were the words echoed everywhere. When some members spoke about the great missionary work and the news of numerous conversions in India and Japan, Camillus said, “For us hospitals are our India and Japan”. He meant that there are lots of occasions and urgency for conversions in the hospital set up, in service to the sick which is as important as mission work and conversions. Later part of his life Camillus had a desire to go to missions especially to India and Japan, but other members of the Order objected this because they needed his presence among them.

There is no doubt that St. Camillus ardently desired to take the gospel message ‘preach the gospel and heal the sick’ to the mission lands. From the first years of the foundation

of the Order, he had planned to journey to Spain and from there to India. But his responsibilities made his absence from Italy impossible. He was aware that in different parts of the world millions and millions of different faiths wait for the apostles of the gospel. By repeating to the confreres with sincerity and emotion that ‘our India and Japan are our hospitals’, he was expressing his secret and profound desire for the missions. He said, “If the people of other faith and Turks see the works of charity of the ministers of the sick, they would convert without any argument”

There were various attempts to go to missions in the very beginning of the Order. Fr. Giuseppe Romaguerra requested permission from the general council for starting a house in Japan during 1605-1644, and the request was turned down with a response that we were not ready for such a foundation. On 1st April 1644, to the request of Fr. Romaguerra, the general council responded “we are highly edified of the desire you have for starting an institute in India, but as of our judgment now it is not possible”
